1971 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The 7th AGM was held on May 1st in London, and was well attended by many Members. Unhappily our Chairman, Mr Hudson, was unable to be present as he had been ill, and was awaiting an operation. This he has now had, and Members will be pleased to hear that he is making good progress. In his absence, the Vice Chairman, Mr R.Silson officiated. The Secretary's and Treasurer's reports showed that the Society had had a successful year, with a membership of 110 - slightly up on the previous year. A satisfactory balance in the bank of £53 on 31.12.70 was mainly due to generous help and support from Members in various money raising events. To maintain our present level of expenditure, further events would be necessary during the year, and the Treasurer asked for ideas and suggestions. Club classes had been well supported, in twenty eight shows, mainly championship shows, but some smaller ones had also been included. At three shows, we had taken stalls, which seemed well worth while from the advertising point of view, and had enabled Members to meet each other. It was hoped that many more shows might be covered during the coming season:

Twenty four rosettes for 'Best in Show' nominations had been claimed since the last AGM., and were awarded at the end of the meeting, together with the eight trophies (see details further on).

ELECTION OF OFFICERS, COMMITTEE and DELEGATES

Mr Hudson was unanimously re-elected as Chairman.

Mr J.S.Lyon was elected as Vice Chairman.

Four Committee members were elected, Mrs A. Allen, Mrs P. Mennim, Miss B. Moyse and Mr R. Warner. Our most grateful thanks go to the retiring members, Miss Griffiths, Mrs Quinton and Mr Silson, for their help and encouragement, and work in support of the Society.

Delegate elected to represent the Society on the Governing Council, Mr Hudson, and Mrs

Mennim as substitute delegate.

Representatives on the JAC - Mrs Mennim and Miss Perkins.

DISCUSSION ON COAT COLOUR

In 'Any Other Business', a long and interesting discussion was held. Sadly we decided that it is possible to breed Tabby Pointed Siamese, without any markings on the back although as yet they are only a small minority. To get rid of markings can take anything up to nine or ten generations of selective breeding. Points which emerged during the exchange of ideas and views were that:-

 Points were not required to be equal in density (e.g. seal tabby points have 'black' and grey stripes on their tails, but only grey stripes on their legs) but should be the same colour range from nose to tail, depending on the basic colouring, i.e. seal, blue or chocolate, etc.

2) As tabby points derive their markings from tabby cats originally, the coat colour as it shades up towards the spine will include spots, blotches or stripes, according to the original tabby pattern. To breed a tabby pointed Siamese with a pale coat, selective breeding is required, bearing in mind that the genes for colour, tabby pattern and agouti banding are all inherited independently of each other, and must be selected accordingly.

3) A tabby point with a very pale coat will also have very pale points, which may take up to

two years to develop satisfactorily.

4) It was suggested that Members should pool their breeding information so as to help each other, either locally or through the Society. If lack of accommodation for breeding stock was a handicap to anyone, Mrs Richardson very generously offered help with this problem.

FUND RAISING

Several suggestions for fund raising were made, and will be considered by the Committee, including the possibility of raising the annual subscription. Miss Brabyn and Mrs Richardson offered to organise stalls at the Midland and Northern shows, where possible.

MRS M. BENNETT

It was announced that the Committee had decided to award Honorary Life Membership to Mrs Bennett. She was the Society's first Treasurer and held office until 1969. This decision was greeted with warm applause.

MR R. PEARS

Mr Pears was also honoured in the same way for his services as the Society's first Secretary. He was not able to attend the AGM., but sent a letter of appreciation. Members present asked that their congratulations to him should be recorded.

LYNX POINTED CAT CLUB

Proposed amalgamation

Members who do not read 'Fur and Feather' will be wondering what has happended with regard to the proposed amalgamation with the Tabby Point Siamese and Progressive Breeders Cat Club.

A joint meeting of the committees of both clubs was held on May 18th 1968 and this was reported to Members last year. Following this, an Inaugural Meeting was arranged for June 29th 1968 - this was prevented by the rail strike. The T.P.S. and P.B.C.C. were invited to fix the new date, but in spite of repeated requests (in August, September and October) did not do so. In November, the L.P.C.C. committee met again and the result of further representations was that the Inaugural Meeting was finally held on January 25th 1969.

(In the meantime, the L.P.C.C. had ceased advertising and had stopped its club classes, believing that there was mutual agreement between the two clubs that amalgamation should take place by September 1st 1968, and expecting that the T.P.S. and P.B.C.C. would do likewise.)

At the January meeting, the voting for amalgamation of the two clubs was 67 for and 17 against. Therefore the meeting proceeded to elect officers and committee for the new club, and to choose a new name (chosen by 22 votes to 7). A date for the first annual general meeting of the new club was arranged.

Shortly after this meeting, all officers drawn from the T.P.S. and P.B.C.C. resigned, saying that they could not recognise the amalgamation as legal. At the same time, a circular was sent to their members, urging them to reconsider their decision. Then the new club's A.G.M. was cancelled by the T.P.S. and P.B.C.C. The matter was referred to the Governing Council, and at a later date, the two clubs were advised to refer it back to their members.

At the L.P.C.C. A.G.M. on May 3rd 1969, these events were reviewed and discussed fully. Members present felt that although it seemed that many members of both clubs wanted amalgamation, in order to form an united specialist club, times were not propitious to continuing with negotiations. Therefore these will cease, and the Club will continue as a separate club.

Recent Members will be interested to note that the Lynx Pointed Cat Club was formed on March 1st 1964, the name 'Lynx' being chosen at a time when there was no name for what we know now as Tabby Pointed Siamese. The L.P.C.C. is thus the original and is still the only specialist club for this breed.

SPECIAL FEATURE - CHAMPION SPOTLIGHT PENNYLYNX

'Pennylynx' was born in June 1963. She was in the second litter born to my beloved 'Praline' and was sired by our 'Whiteoaks Malahide'. 'Penny' was 'Pralines' first tabby point girl (lynx of course in those days). She had five brothers which included 'Polaminx' (bought later by Mrs Greta Hindley), and my own pixie-faced light as a feather 'Burlinks'.

I think those six were the wildest most air born kittens that I have ever known! They would arrive down the garden steps like thistle-down in a high wind. Penny had the most advantage as her ears were like wings, soft, grey, and overbalancing like a hawk-moth.

Up to five months it was 'Bur' though that was the real eye-catcher, and in the few AOV classes that they were allowed to enter, Bur would take the First prize, and Penny the second. Then suddenly at six months Penny took over and the roles were reversed. Letters came from all over the world with the constant request ''Please sell us a Pennylynx daughter'', but alas her kittens were few.

In 1966 at last the Lynx Points were recognised as Siamese Tabby Points Breed 32, however they had to forfeit their lovely name 'Lynx'.

Penny went to the first show where they were fully recognised. The show was in Reading, Berkshire. It was 'The Siamese Cat Society of The British Empire Show'. There was great excitement. The crowds gathered round her cage, and saw the first Tabby Point ever awarded its first challenge certificate. Even then the supreme triumph was unexpected. Richard and I were talking to Mrs Dorothy Yorke (Reoky) by the kittens' pens. One of our kittens by Burlinks was going up for Best in Show. We could not see the platform from where we were, so I climbed on a chair, and informed the others that they were still judging the adults, and that there was a fantastically type tabby point on the platform. Some-one leant up to me and said, "but it is yours". I could not believe it, and I can not think of much that beats that moment for me. Penny went on to win Best Exhibit, and thoroughly upset all the seal point owners etc, who still looked upon tabby points as bastards, in those days!!

At her next two shows Penny went on to win her other two Challenge Certificates, and was both times nominated for Best in Show. She then retired, the first Tabby Point Champion in Europe, possibly in the world.

We then started to think about breeding her, however, to our regret only two of her litters could be termed successful. One when she was three years old, and the other when she was nearly six.

The first of these two litters contained two seal point girls. Both brought in plenty of red cards. Mrs Bullock had 'Peseta' and Suzanne Smith had 'Farthing'. Both these died young but Suzanne remained one of Penny's greatest fans. Of the boys the least good was 'Halfpenny', he was on the platform at Bournemouth for Best Siamese kitten. Penny got her third challenge the same day.

The other successful litter came after two previous caesarians. Imagine our delight when her last chance presented us with three lovely living kittens. One, granted, was smalland frail. For days we fought for his life, forcing milk in his mouth with a paint brush. After that it was plain sailing and he eventually went to Suzanne Smith to shower her with love and rosettes. This boy we called 'Rouble'.

There was one girl in the litter, to be our own, of course. She was long, and thin, and unbelievably typy, and she was a Tabby Point. This was our 'Kopeika', and she had inherited many of the endearing ways of her grandmother 'Praline'. That she was Best Exhibit when only five months seemed an added bonus.

Penny was a home loving cat, not always off hunting like her mother Praline. She loved her home comforts which included my bed! She was allergic to dogs though, especially black dogs, and once vanished up a chimney for hours when one entered the garden.

She loved people though, and admiration, and would enter a crowded room always aware that she was leing admired. She was also a beautiful model to photograph and I was always trying to make pottery models of her. Most people thought I overdid the ears, but that's how they really were.

It's now several months since she died but we still miss her warm personality and the aesthetic pleasure that it gave us to look at her.

'Kopeika', I know still hopes that she will come walking through the door.

To say a few words about Praline, who was such a generous cat in every way, is an impossibility.

Arriving in a household already saturated with cats it was incredible how quickly the whole household 'fell' for her - I think it was the enormous deep blue eyes, quite the largest I have ever seen short of a Margay.

It began in November 1961. Mrs Pears arrived with a calling queen "Mistee", who Mrs Pears imagined might be a blue-point. I assured her she was not, but that she was an excessively beautiful cat - and please could I have one of the kittens when the time came. Mistee went to our Troubadour who had always been a particular favourite of mine. Mistee behaved beautifully, easy and affectionate, singing away with her sweet musical voice. The kittens arrived late in January - seven, and four were the unusual stripey pointed Siamese! I could not get over to see them until they were eight weeks old, having been in hospital where I sat in my bed dreaming about Mistee's kittens. At last I went home and my first outing was over to Oxfed to see Mrs Pears and the precious litter. They were all lovely, but Praline with her wonderful eyes and Troubadour's profile was the one for us. She was accepted by the cat household almost at once being excessively friendly and without any fear, so that no one was tempted to bully her.

She grew quickly, beautifully long in her body, tail and head, and, as one well known breeder commented on seeing her "She is certainly Siamese - Siamese PLUS". During 1962 I showed her in an exhibition cage at all the big shows and she had many admiring followers, though of course, there were a few old diehards who thought anything Siamese that was not a seal-point was automatically undesirable. The great majority of the public were at her beautifully black-backed feet!

When the first club - The Lynx Pointed Cat Club - was formed for this new variety in the summer of 1962, Praline played hostess to the handful of enthusiastic members that met at Little Foxes.

Praline was very generous with her calling (but I must say that the note of her voice was highpitched and musical, not all that grating); she was also very generous with her kittens. Apart from her first
mating with Mrs Hudson's 'Faux Pas' and one illegitimate litter, all her kittens were by 'Whiteoaks Malahide'
- whom she found not quite as passionate as she would have wished! Her kittens certainly had quality as well
as quantity - six or seven being her average litter, though twice she had nine! We have many photos and films
of her in what seemed to be her normal condition enormous! She certainly was a marvellous mother and always at her happiest with kittens in her arms. At five years old, she had produced sixty kittens, many of whom
became very well known - Spotlight Ricky Dicky, Chantilly, Frankincense (now an international champion), our
own champion Pennylynx, and Burlinks. She adored Penny and would always kiss her on the nose whenever
they met.

In 1967 things started going wrong. First, a litter of one deformed kitten; then much calling and no kittens. In 1968 she suddenly became very ill and had to have a hysterectomy. Internal abcesses had burst and peritonitis had set in. For a day it was touch and go, but then she made a splendid and quick recovery. Her chief pastime now became hunting. Providing she was not too far away, she was always most obedient and on hearing my anxious shouts in the woods, would return at whirlwind speed.

Praline was without doubt the 'Queen' cat of the cattery and would keep al! the others in order. Not in a vicious 'claws out' way, but with an authorative tap on the bottom or a cuff on the ear when they were squabbling. If there was any sign of outside danger, such as window cleaners or dustbin men, she would alert everyone with her high pitched sing-song growl - just like the Lynx in the London Zoo! She was extremely intelligent and always gave me the feeling she was looking after me. She was very fond of sitting for hours in the pottery with me - with the exception of Penny, she allowed none of the other cats in there, which was just as well when the door was left open. On two occasions she quite clearly came to fetch me from the pottery, because things were wrong in the house. Her hysterical miaowing was absolutely impossible to ignore. On the first occasion someone had left a tap on, and water was pouring through the downstair rooms; the second time a cushion was on fire!

Early in 1969 Penny actually had three living kittens from her third and final Caesarian. Praline was as pleased as I was, and as soon as I allowed her, was in with the precious little things, cleaning and 'feeding' them, and later, teaching them the wildest games, especially the very precocious Kopeika. One of her favourite games was to come out of the kitchen at top speed, tear down the passage into the sitting room, jump on the back of every sofa and chair with enormous bounds (as she was a considerable weight, one or two might crash to the floor), returning again to the kitchen at top speed. She would repeat the whole performance again and again. Tentatively they would start to copy her, and with the little things flying about behind her, Praline would be in high delight.

Sometime in the spring I noticed a little lump in one of her mammary glands. At first I thought this was the result of trying to nurse. Penny's kittens, but as it did no go, I took her to the vet. He thought it safest to remove it. She had the operation early in June. The gash appeared much larger than I thought it would be, and it took some time to heal, but she was eating well and was quite active. Two weeks later, the vet, phoned me to say it had been identified as cancer. For two months she appeared well, not so active and always keeping very close to me. Early in August, she started coughing, and began to look not well', and her coat was rough. Many more little lumps arrived underneath her, and on 19th August I had to have her put to sleep - my beloved Praline. Penny and I will always miss her.

NEWS LETTER November 1971

It is good to be able to start on a happy note, with news of our Chairman. Mr Hudson is fully recovered from a serious operation, and all the good wishes and prayers of the Members who knew of his illness have been a great support to him. You will be pleased to know that the Committee sent flowers to him when he was in hospital, and he was cheered by this. We welcomed him with great warmth when he again took the Chair at the last Meeting. Meanwhile, our thanks were due to Mr Lyon who carried on the work in his capacity as deputy Chairman.

STANDARD OF POINTS

On June 19th many of our Members attended a meeting at the Y.W.C.A. in Great Russell Street, at the invitation of The Tabby Point Siamese and Progressive Breeders Cat Club. Dr Groom was in the Chair, and a wide range of topics, concerning show standards and breeding were fully discussed. A number of judges, who had come to learn more about the breed, expressed appreciation of the successful meeting at the end of the afternoon. We all enjoyed the many colour slides of their cats, which members of both clubs had kindly brought along. Many of the features we had discussed were thus very clearly demonstrated and we all felt glad to discover that we share the same idea as to how the ideal Tabby Point should look.

It was agreed that the Standard of Points needed revision, and a further meeting will be held shortly between the two committees, T.P.S.C.S. and T.P.S. & P.B.C.C. to draw up recommendations, to go first to the Joint Advisory Committee (Siamese) and then to the Governing Council.

Coat colour was of course one of the main points discussed, and all agreed that a pale unmarked coat was the ideal. The ideal is seldom achieved, alas. If the S.O.P. is revised to award a higher proportion of points for a pale coat, this will be a step in the right direction. To achieve our aim, however, we shall need support and agreement from other Siamese clubs, as this problem is shared with all Siamese, Seal points and blue points have noticeably lost their contrast, in pursuit of perfect type. Judges are, understandably, in a dilemma, over type versus colour. (Many of them may never have seen a really pale adult seal point?) One result of this dilemma was seen at the Siamese Cat Club show last month, where a typey 'seal point' won well in a premier class. 'Coal black' would have been a better description!

The geneticists tell us that pale coats may be acquired by selective breeding and that it will take a long time. To help each other in this, send in to the Secretary the names of any Siamese you come across who have pale coats, providing that their type is reasonable (Don't include chocolate or lilac points, as their colours are diluted anyway). Later, if you use these cats in your breeding programme, report whether or not you are satisfied with the results. If we get sufficient response, this information could be made available to all members, and should be a great help to us all.

STALLS

Since the last newsletter, we have had four Club stalls. These were at the Herts. & Middle-sex Cat Club, Kentish Cat Society show in Gravesend, The Siamese Cat Club show, and the Northern Counties Cat Club show. As usual, these made a good meeting place for Members, new Members were introduced, and the Treasurer's ever-anxious mind greatly calmed by the financial success of them all. She sends her thanks particularly to Mr and Mrs Allen (Starfall Siamese) and Mrs E. Richardson (Pendlemist Siamese) for their hard work in running the stalls.

GARDEN PARTY

On August 29th the East Sussex Pedigree Cat Club joined us in organising a Garden Party at Summerdale, Ersham Road, Hailsham. About seventy people came, and although the weather was rather damp, everyone seemed to enjoy meeting old friends and making new ones. These combined events seem to be an excellent idea as many artificial barriers are broken down and all the horizons are broadened a little. The resultant goodwill must, in the end, benefit the Fancy.

At this point, you cannot be blamed for leaning back as you think "Well, I'm glad all goes well with the Club." You may even stop reading since there is nothing so far to claim your involvement. YOU COULDN'T BE WRONGER! Leap up at once and check your larder shelves. They are groaning under the weight of chutney, bramble jelly, pickled onions, home-made marmalade, strawberry jam, and of course, gently maturing Christmas cakes and puddings. If not, then please correct this awful state of things,

for our stall at the National Cat Club show needs you. NEEDS you, I say, needs YOU. On December 11th at Olympia, we are going to supply hundreds of lucky people with our home-made produce. PROPOSAL TO GOVERNING COUNCIL

This gives delegates no opportunity to consult their club committees, and voting is therefore personal. NEWS LETTER May 1972

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The Society's 8th A.G.M. was held on March 25th 1972 and was well attended by 30 Members. Officers elected were Mr C.E.Hudson as Chairman, and Mr J.S.Lyon as vice chairman. Four vacancies on the Committee were filled by Mrs M.Hudson, Mrs M.Silson, Mrs P.Warner and Mrs J.Allen. Mrs P. Mennim was elected as Delegate to the G.C.C.F., with Miss Perkins as substitute. Mrs Yorke and Miss Perkins were elected as representatives on the Joint Advisory Committee (Siamese).

The Annual Report showed that again the Society had had a successful year, and membership had risen to 112. Classes had been guaranteed in 27 shows and were mostly well supported. The Committee were most grateful to Mrs H.Humphreys for the gift of a new trophy, the Ubon Tankard. This had been allocated for the best TP adult at the National Show each year.

A revised Standard of Points had been under discussion, and we hope that it will be possible to meet the Progressive Breeders Cat Club shortly in order to finalise the new standard. This would then be put to the J.A.C., prior to being presented to the G.C.C.F.

Your Committee put forward a resolution to the G.C.C.F., concerning the election of officers, asking that nominations be published one month before election, so that your delegate may receive guidance from the club. This was discussed, but turned down as impracticable.

The proposed increase in entry fees and subscription rates was discussed and Members agreed that an increase was needed. From January 1st 1973 entry fees will be 50p per person, single annual subscription 100p., joint annual subscription 150p., and Life Membership £10.

In Any Other Business, the practice of giving live pets as competition prizes was condemned by Members. As there is as yet no legislation to control this, it seemed that the most effective protest comes from individual action. A newspaper cutting was shown to the meeting, and the Secretary was asked to forward it to the G.C.C.F.

Disappointment was expressed at the small number of entries in the classes for Champion of Champions, and Premier of Premiers, and Members discussed various ideas for making the classes more attractive.

The meeting closed with the presentation of Trophies, Cups and Rosettes.

CONGRATULATIONS!

Congratulations Anne, on breeding your own Champion - sorry! - Grand Champion. A lovely cat and a worthy winner.

Our congratulations too, to our winners at the Siamese Cat Club show. The Grand Challenge Certificate was won by Peggy Annuskans' Zils Zeno, with Seremban Liger as runner-up this time. The Grand Premier Certificate went to Supra Taipan. Top honours of the show carried off by Tabby Points! Wonderful!

WITHHOLDING OF CHALLENGE CERTIFICATES

This has caused much comment recently, and some of our Members were amongst those who were disappointed. Obviously a Challenge Certificate must be given only to those cats who merit one, and no one would want it to be awarded without due care and consideration. In a perfect world, judges would be experts at interpreting the 'Standard of Points' for each breed and would allocate accurately marks for each aspect of the cat. Then Challenge Certificates could be awarded consistently to all those cats scoring a predetermined number of points. True, Challenge Certificates may still be withheld, if the cats do not score enough marks, but also there might well be more than one cat in the class who scores high points. Logically, more than one Challenge Certificate should then be awarded. Alas, this is still an imperfect world.

SHOW SECRETARY

At the committee meeting held on September 2nd it was agreed that a Show Support Secretary should be appointed. Anne Allen, who makes such a success of the Club stalls, was elected unanimously. Her duties comprise 1) sending support to shows in the form of club classes, 2) advertising in catalogues, 3) booking and running stalls, 4) recording Members' results and making an analysis for the award of trophies. ODDITIES

Queer things are sometimes written about Tabby Points. One recent writer refers to the necessity for 'breeding back to Seal every now and then lest kittens should arrive which are coloured all over."

Well, well! There seems to be some confusion of thought here. In the early days of Tabby Points, breeding back to Seals was practised in order to perfect the type. Nowadays with the excellent type available in many TPs, this should no longer be necessary. However, both sire and dam (whatever the Siamese colour) should be matched with as much care and knowledge as the breeder can muster. Reference to the Society's leaflet on 'Choosing a Stud' by Pat Turner, should help.

No - all-over markings on TPs is a different problem, and one that bedevils many of our cats. It is the result of poor contrast between coat colour and points, and this is common in Siamese generally. It is necessary to choose breeding stock from cats with pale unmarked coats, and then to choose pale coats again in the next generation and so on. A long and tedious process which will take several generations in which to achieve success.

So, do not mate your TP back to any old Seal, or you may achieve the coloured all over effect that the misguided writer refers to, and that we are trying to avoid.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The Annual Report showed that the Society had had another successful year. Membership had risen to 124, and club funds stood at £76. Newsletters had been circulated in May and November; club classes in shows had mostly been well supported, and this was reflected in the cost of guarantees which had dropped from £14 in 1971 to £9 in 1972. Stalls had been taken at six shows, which Mr and Mrs Allen organised with their usual financial and social success. Two new trophies had been given to the Society this year. Mrs Mennim gave a brief report on the G.C.C.F. and Mrs Yorke's report concerning the J.A.C. was read. The J.A.C. had accepted our new Standard of Points and this is reported more fully further on in the Newsletter.

A proposal was put to the meeting that rosettes be given for club class winners at all Championship shows. This was widely discussed, and it seemed that Members felt that the Society could not afford the cost (approx. £20) and also that if too many rosettes were awarded, they ceased to be of value. Proposed by Mrs M.Chadwick, seconded by Miss B.Perkins, a vote was taken and the proposal was heavily defeated.

In Any Other Business, Mrs Wagstaff asked for the Society's support for a supreme cat show to be held, to be comparable with Crufts'. This was agreed, and delegates were instructed to support the idea when it came before the G.C.C.F.

The Meeting closed with the presentation of rosettes and trophies.

THE STANDARD OF POINTS

The revised Standard was accepted by the J.A.C. (Siamese) on February 24th 1973, and has been forwarded to the G.C.C.F. for ratification. When - or, if it is ratified, each Member will receive a copy.

In the new Standard, instead of referring to the 'recognised Siamese colours', these are now listed - seal, blue, chocolate, lilac, red, cream and tortie. It had always been intended in our original Standard that any colour recognised in solid point Siamese should also be included in the tabby series, but red TPs and tortie TPs have been registered wrongly. The red TPs as red points (32a) and tortie TPs as either Tabby Points (32) or as 'any other dilution' (32c).

It is manifestly absurd that red TPs and red points should be grouped together. Granted they look alike, and cannot be distinguished until breeding tests prove which they are, but the Standard of Points for one requires stripes, and the Standard for the other requires solid colour - opposing aims! As any TP must have at least one TP parent, recommendations have been made to the G.C.C.F. that any red Siamese having a TP parent should be registered as a TP until breeding tests suggest otherwise. As torties are inevitably involved with reds, it is logical to register tortie TPs (as well as the reds) as Tabby Points (32). Provision for tortie TPs is therefore included in the new Standard.

Apart from these points, there is little else new. Most of the alterations involve only a word or two, intended to tidy up and simplify the meaning and the arrangement of the Standard. Five extra points are placed on coat colour, and it is hoped that this will encourage the breeding of pale coated cats.

THE STANDARD AND REGISTRATION

All Members should have received a copy of the new Standard of Points, which were sent out in August. Additional copies are available on club stalls.

At the Council Meeting on October 24th 1973, we requested Council to transfer to breed 32 all Tabby Points which had previously been registered as breed 32c, and this request was granted. important decision means that all TPs are now under breed 32, regardless of colour, and all may be shown in the open classes for TPs, as well as our club classes (for which they have always been eligible).

Members who own cats registered as 32c should now return their certificates with a request for alteration of the breed number. Certificates should be sent to Mr Loveys for forwarding to the appropriate Registrar. At the time of going to print, it is not known who this will be. There is no charge for this alteration, which is automatic for all TPs in 32c.

Owners of cats who have been wrongly registered (and are not already in 32c) - for example, a red TP registered as a red point, 32a - will need to apply for individual consideration. Consult the Registrar as to how this should be done. Breeders are advised to register all red kittens with a TP parent as TPs, breed 32. Then if breeding results prove the cat to be a red point after all, re-registration can be applied for later.

All this will only affect a handful of animals, as most TP breeders aim at producing beautifully marked cats in the four main colours, seal, chocolate, blue and lilac. It is felt by many that tortie mottling spoils the pattern of stripes, and the enchanting symmetry of the glorious tabby point at its best, is lost in the tortie tabby point.

GCCF RULING

It was proposed by the Red and Tortie Point Siamese Cat Club that all red points Siamese with one or two Tabby point parents should be registered as Breed 32, Red Tabby Points, until such time as breeding results should prove otherwise.

This proposal was made for two main reasons, i) Many overseas countries do not recognise red or tortie tabby points, and buyers are not happy with red points that produce tabby point offspring and, ii) Some breeders feel that Tabby Point ancestry tends to produce red points with a pale point colour, and that the very pale pointed cats are really red tabby points, but this view is not fully shared by the However, the committee felt that efforts to breed red points with good solid point colour will not be helped by the introduction of the Tabby factor. This proposal has been agreed by the GCCF.

A presentation has been made to Mrs Daniels of a club trophy, to congratulate her beautiful **Champion Shybu Spyridon** on becoming Englands first Grand Premier Tabby Point. It was hoped to award this trophy at the AGM in April but unfortunately it was not ready in time.

AILMENTS. PART 1 - DIARRHOEA

Have you ever had a kitten with diarrhoea? Most of us have. If it was grey in colour, and foul smelling, and passed at frequent periods, by a young kitten, whose appetite was inconsistent with a poor bodily condition, the chances are that it was suffering from Vitamin A deficiency. Of course your veterinary surgeon would have to diagnose this. However, it is quite a common condition in young kittens that often goes undiagnosed. Vitamin A helps to slow the process of food through the bowel, and increase absorbtion. Response to Vitamin A is usually spectacular. Your Vet will usually advise initial intramuscular injections of this vitamin and subsequent oral dosing. Halibut and cod-liver oils are a rich sourse of Vitamin A. Therefore attention to your kittens' diet could prevent this from occuring. Overdosage could be dangerous. (AIAT)

Congratulations to the first Grand Premier Tabby Point!

Shybu Spyridon recently gained his third Grand Premier Certificate, and rounded off a triumphant year for his owner, Mrs Daniels, in which he was nominated for Best in Show at least three times. He also won the Society's Chippy Cup, the points cup for the best neuter.

Cheona Memnon (owned by Mr Howard Watkins) who made a most successful debut at the National show last December, has now won his first Premier Certificate at the Bedford and District show. At the National, Memnon won his kitten class, went on to win 'Best of Breed', and was awarded a beautiful Dankat rosette which had been presented by Mrs Christensen of Denmark for the best TP.

1973 was a successful year for another neuter TP, *Papaya Tee Rex*. QUARANTINE CATTERIES

Earlier this year correspondence in Fur and Feather drew attention to the unsatisfactory conditions in some quarantine catteries. One can assume that if the cat's owner had known the conditions beforehand, a different cattery would have been chosen.

Thanks to one of our Members, Mrs Jill Almond, we now hold a list of Ministry approved quarantine catteries in England. Mrs Almond did a survey last summer on behalf of the Diplomatic Service Wives Association, and has compiled a list of 23 catteries. The information (supplied by the proprietors concerned) includes charges, carrying fees, diets, heating, individual runs, visiting hours, etc. The list includes 5 catteries which are recommended, and one which is very highly recommended; recommendations are from members of the D.S.W.A. Omitted from the list are those who did not reply to Mrs Almond's enquiries, and those already known to the D.S.W.A. members to be unsatisfactory.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The 11th Annual General Meeting was held at the YWCA on April 12th 1975, and we had the best attendance ever.

The Annual Report showed yet another successful year, with membership standing at 139, and more money in the bank than last year, thanks to the very successful stalls etc. In spite of rising costs Newsletters and printed articles have been circulated, and club classes have been catered for.

However three decisions have been made by your committee -

- Due to increased support for club classes, they will in future be split into Male and Female, in Adult and Kitten classes at Championship Shows.
- 2. In future ONE Best in Show Nomination Rosette only will be awarded to each cat, regardless of how many nominations it wins in a year. An exhibit may win one as a Kitten and one as a Cat in the same year. This decision had to be made due to immense rise in price for rosettes, i.e. cost of rosettes in 1972, £4 in 1975, £44.
- A stud list of Tabby Points will be published. Members owning a stud please send the following details: Name of Cat, Date of birth, Colour, Parents and their Colour, Owner's Name, Address and Phone Number.

During the year four new trophies have been awarded, the Casmen Trophy and the Ranjeeta Cup by Mrs Pat Mennim, the Cherokee Cup by Mrs Bramble, and the Kinkleton's Peregrine Cup by Mrs Robins. Many thanks go to all these kind members.

A brief report on the GCCF was given by Miss Perkins. This included the decision to register all Cream Points with a Tabby Point parent as Tabby Points Breed 32. AOC Siamese will be Breed 32X. A brief report was given by Mrs Pat Mennim on the JAC Meetings.

Then followed the election of Officers, Committee and Delegates. Mr Richard Warner was unanimously re-elected as Chairman, and Mr Lyon as Vice Chairman. Four vacancies were vacant on the Committee and the following were elected; Mrs A, Allen, Mrs Mennim, Mrs Greenland, Mrs Moore.

Delegate to the GCCF Miss Perkins, Substitute Delegate Mrs Greenland. Representative on the JAC (Siamese) Mrs Mennin and Mr Niblett.

The committee provided some lovely sustenance in the form of cakes and gorgeous pastries to suplement the tea, and the meeting was drawn to a conclusion with the award of the Cups and Trophies and Best in Show Nomination Rosettes, won by this years lucky winners.

Miss Perkins received a letter from the Siamese and Shorthair Society of Oueensland, Australia complimenting the Club on its excellent articles. They requested that they be allowed to re-print the articles and circulate them to their members, as they have helped so many people in trouble. In return they offered to let us re-print their articles. Your committee decided in favour of this, if members have no objection.

KITTENS FOR SALE?

AILMENTS. Part 2 - Escherichia Coli (E-Coli)

When a condition is present that brings about stress, i.e., going to stud, or away to board, or maybe kittening, the coliform bacteria that are the normal inhabitants of the gut, sometimes cause disease, which takes the form of a very severe enteritis or persistant diarrhoea. Kittens that receive any stress via their mother's milk, may even be a risk, as are kittens or cats that are kept in conditions of poor hygiene.

To try to avoid this risk try to make sure that your kittens are born under the most hygienic conditions possible, feed the mothers well, frequently clean litter trays, and try and prevent the kittens from suffering any stress by feeding them a well balanced diet.

Often one hears people say is 'E coli' different to 'B coli'? Well 'E coli' stands for Escherichia Coli, and 'B coli' for Bacterium Coli. 'E coli' is just a sub group of the 'B coli'. This family include all the Salmonella group of bacteria, that is the group referred to a the 'food poisoning group'.

Unfortunately once this condition is established it can be hard to eradicate. Some of the more potent antibiotics are effective, in some cases, but once the mucous membrance in the intestines is impaired disease may be caused in other parts of the body by the bacteria invading the body tissue. This can be responsible for, abortion, cystitis. Vaccines can be made up, but these only have a limited application as they are of course only effective against the strain they are made up from, and there are so many different strains. Of course a cat may self-immunise itself; after a period of time, they make up enough antibodies to ward off the disease. Vaccines are usually only used as a last resort, if a particular bacterium is unresponsive to a wide-spectrum antibiotic.

NEWS OF OUR CATS

The lovely *Sianjo Teazel* became the first TP Champion of the season at the Bedford show. At the SCA show, she gained her first Grand Challenge, and went on to become Best Female Adult. Among males doing very well are Jillian Moore's *Cheona Pindar*, Mrs Searby's *Dauntsea Leopold*, and Venita Cook's *Denka Tutankhaten*. *Cheona Pindar* has a really super success story, being unbeaten as a kitten, and receiving numerous Best in Show awards to his credit. As an adult, he has been equally successful, winning his first CC at Three Counties show, his second at Siamese Cat Club show, where he was also Best Exhibit, and his third at Midland Counties. Congratulations, *Champion Cheona Pindar*, and Jillian. *Denka Tutankhaten*, a red TP, has now obtained two CC's and was nominated for Best in Show at South Shields. We wish you success, Venita, let's hope we shall soon have the first red TP champion! Venita tells us that she now has a cream TP., so he may well be the first on the bench.

Many others are doing so well that it is impossible to mention them all. Best in Show Siamese kitten at Bedford was Joan Grabham's Whiterose Moonstone, bred by Suzanne Smith. Other Whiteroses doing well are Kara and Angelique. At the Herts and Middlesex, the Lyon's Lymekilns Luri won the males' CC., winning in spite of the terrible bomb scare. Mrs Pumares' Moondance Marina has done really well this season, winning her third consecutive CC at Midland Counties, and Best of Breed. Moonfleet Firecloud, a red TP neuter, was first in the club class at the Kensington show, well done, Redi and Mrs Agricola. (More news about neuters, please). Probably the greatest success to date was to see all those TP's in the Best in Show pens at the Siamese Cat Club show. Ch. Cheona Pindar best Male Adult and Best Exhibit; Ch. Sianjo Teazel Best Female Adult; and Ch. Bayard Boadicea Best Neuter. How's that for a spectacular line-up?

STAR WRITE-UP

CUPS and TROPHIES

Will holders of trophies please make sure that they return them to Ann Allen by the first week in March, as they have to be revalued before the AGM. The Summerdale trophy has now been replaced, due to extensive damage which the original trophy sustained in the hands of the holder. *Please*, if you are awarded a trophy, look after it to the best of your ability, so that another member may enjoy it in the future.

REGISTRATION OF RED POINTED CATS

At the AGM this year, members asked the committee to look into, and seek to reverse, the registration rule concerning red Siamese which have a TP parent. As a result, our delegates took this to the JAC, at the meeting held on May 31st 1975. The JAC listened to our case very sympathetically, and discussed it. However it was decided to deal fully with this problem when the work begins on reclassifying all Siamese. We can only hope that this will not be too long delayed,

For those members who did not attend the AGM, a few words of explanation.....Red Points and red tabby points are virtually indistinguisable. However, in red points one is selecting for the most solid points it is possible to attain, and with a red tabby point, clear striping, a good ringed tail and clear thumb prints, are a must.

A true red point will never produce tabby points of any colour (unless mated to a TP of course) whereas a red TP can produce TP's of various colours and solid points, too. A tabby point pure for the agouti gene will only produce tabby points as it breeds true.

The registration rules governing at present dictate that the phenotype (the appearance) of a cat decided the breed, and so, providing the red Siamese has at least one TP parent, it must be registered as a red tabby point, at least until proven not to be.

This is really perfectly logical. What causes consternation to some of our members is that such a red tabby point, will during its show career compete against other colour tabby points, possibly beating them. However when it comes to breeding, this cat may turn out not to have been a tabby point at all

When reclassification of the Siamese section comes, we would hope for a breed number for each different colour of tabby points, but until then, it is surely best to have all TP's under one number. It has been a long slow haul from AOV, breed no. 26, to Tabby Points, breed no. 32. Until sensible classification is achieved, members are urged to avoid mating tabby points with red and tortie points.....that is, if you want to know whether the kittens are red points or red tabby points!

OVERSEAS MEMBERS

The club has had a nice letter from one of our members in Sweden, Mrs Eiwor Anderson. Mrs Anderson has been breeding Siamese for fifteen years and has been an international FIFE judge for the past eight years. She now owns three British imported Siamese, names *Shybu Vanya*, TP bred by Mrs Bullock, *Moonfleet Coral Shimmer*, a lilac tortie point bred by Mrs Greenland, and a SP *Quintral Delilah* bred by Mrs Abbey. Mrs Anderson is an ardent tabby point admirer, and is fighting for their rights in Sweden, where apparently there are some very strong views on TP's which she thought you would be interested to hear.

All the 32 group Siamese (tabby, red and torties), may not be bred into the 24 group (seal, choc., blue and lilac). In fact, until April this year, a 24 group Siamese born out of a 32 parent could not even be registered in group 24, but had to stay in the 32 group for ever. Mrs Anderson and others working with 32's sent a proposal to 'Sverak' to try to stop this. However all that was gained was that 24's born out of 32 parents are now allowed to join the 24 group after five generations, providing that they are not mixed with 32's again! So Sweden still has a long way to go before tabby points and the other 32's gain full rights.

Mrs Anderson tells us that her Shybu Vanya was the first TP in Sweden. She now has bred a loveley daughter out of Vanya called San-T-Ree Tiger Tanya, who is doing very well, also San-T-Ree Filagree who was Best Siamese Kitten at the show in Oslo, judged of course by an English Judge, Mrs Gilesl From Denmark we hear that Mrs Carina Las Ville's Corinne Idol de Lynx was Best Siamese Kitten at the show in Denmark. Congratulations, Carina.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The 12th AGM was held at the YWCA on 13th March 1976. In the chair was our Vice-Chairman, Mr Lyons. There was a good attendance and the meeting commenced with the apologies for absence. Our secretary then read the annual report. Membership stands at 166, 27 being recruited this last season. Two news letters, list of members, and a stud list, were circulated to members during the year. The splitting of club classes during the trial year proved very successful. Our President has most generously said she will pay any guarantees needed. A vote of thanks was made to Ann Allen for all the dedicated work she has done as Show Secretary for the club. Ann felt she must resign due to pressure of other work. A presentation was made to her of a lovely bouquet of flowers. Ann was quite overcome! The committee asked Mary Jarrett if she would take on the position, and she has agreed. Mary, and her husband Eric have been ably running our stalls for us.

Hon. Life membership was offered to Tim Hudson, our ex-chairman, and Vice-President, in recognition of all his services to the club. We are delighted that he has accepted. The meeting then adjourned for a super tea, provided by committee and members. Election followed, for four committee places, Mrs Aslin and Mrs Silson were re-elected and joined by Mrs Jarrett and Mrs Baughan. NEWS OF OUR CATS

The beautiful *Teazel* has become a mum. She had two babes by Anna's lovely boy, Sianjo Tiberius. Anna is planning to have Teazel mated with Cheona Pindar next time, so good luck Anna. *Pindar* has just been nominated 'Best Siamese' and 'Supreme Cat', in the British Cat World Awards. This means it is the second year running that this great achievement has gone to a Siamese, so Pindar succeedes Gd. Ch. Darling Red Shadow. Congratulations Gillian and Pindar. Gillian tells me that she has high hopes that Pindar may prove pure for agouti, as to date he has sired only TP kittens to solid and tabby queens. There are very few TP's which are pure, so he could certainly prove a very useful addition to the fancy. In particular, he could be used to produce red-tabby points, which would definitely be tabby points, and not red-points in disguise!

I have news of a winning neuter, *Dandycat Marco-Polo*, a lilac TP owned by Mrs Marion Miller. He was Best in Show at the SCA, and gained his third premier certificate, making him a Premier. He won his other two at Wessex, Coventry and Leicester. Well done Marion, maybe he will win one of our lovely neuter trophies.

We have had two very lovely ladies vying for the C.C's in the female classes, namely, Janice Brain's *Moondance Jocasta*, and Mrs Webb's, *Holcroft Chantal*. Jocasta is a very beautiful chocolate TP., and Chantal, (also very beautiful) is a seal TP. Jocasta has so many wins to her credit, the latest being Grand Challenge at the SCC Show, and Best in Show. Chantal has won two CC's, and was Best in Show Kitten at the SCA. Let's hope by the time this goes to print she will have her third.

There have been several lovely kittens, a little gem I must mention is *Cheona Fabia*, a real little cracker, with super ears and super tufts to go with them. Fabia won her open at Three Counties, and Herts and Middlesex — another winner for Gillian.

My own Holcroft Wizard, who I am delighted to own, won his opens at SCA, Herts and Middlesex, and South Western, and was Nominated for Best in Show at the latter two.

There must have been so many other winners, so if you would like a mention for your cat, do write. Ed.

INHERITANCE OF THE AGOUTI GENE

Talking to members, I realise that some still feel very confused about the inheritance of the agouti gene in TP cats.

To refresh those that do feel this way, if a cat is true breeding for agouti, it means it will only ever produce TP kittens, which ever colour its mate may be.

Basically there are two types of TP., those which carry non-agouti and those which are pure for agouti. It is not until you come to breed your TP that you will find out which type it is, (unless of course it comes from two parents which are certified both pure for agouti).

To test mate, quicker results will be obtained if your TP is mated to one of the breed 24 series. If all the resulting kittens are TP you will be part of the way towards knowing which your TP is. Your cat must produce 12—15 kittens all TP before you can be sure that your cat is pure for agouti. If it produces just one breed 24 kitten, your TP is not pure for the agouti gene.

If two TP cats both carrying non-agouti are mated together the resulting kittens will be 50% tabby-point (non-agouti)., 25% tabby-point (pure agouti)., and 25% breed 24. Therefore do not rely on the fact that if you mate two TP cats together that you will have all, or any TP kittens, as if there are only three in the litter they may well be all breed 24, if you are unlucky.

It really make little difference whether your cat is pure for agouti, or not, unless you want litters of all TP kittens, it certainly does not make that TP any better, or any worse, than any other. However, remember that to stand a chance of having TP kittens in your litter, one parent at least must be tabby, as tabby is a dominant gene, and not recessive. This disposes of the old theory that if your cat has a TP somewhere in its pedigree way back it may produce a TP throughout! Ed.

HOW TO BREED A CHAMPION by AN OBSERVING MEMBER

That is indeed the question, as lets face it, that is what most of us are aiming for. Why are some so very successful, and others never quite make it?

It is certainly not a matter of mating a Champ to a Champ, although in some cases this method sometimes works, but it is not any guarantee. It is very much of a lottery. One theory followed by some of the wealthier in our little fellowship, is to buy the top winning kittens, and when old enough mate to the top winning males. Alas this does not always work either, and costs a small fortune.

Other people spend hours studying pedigrees. The young mother to-be has her pedigree written out against several different studs pedigrees to see how the future kitten's pedigrees would look, how the lines blend in and so forth. Results are usually far more promising although this certainly takes up far more time, knowledge, and skill, than just counting up cards on a cage front.

Some people seem to have the 'Midas touch'. They use completely unknown stock, and by instinct seem to come up with a Champion. These people are very lucky, and much envied by other breeders. Having feelings about certain animals, that bear fruit, is a blessing given to few. The question still remains unanswered. Some of us will manage it, some of us will not, but it's certainly great fun trying.

TRIBUTE TO MISS TEE KAT

Mrs Pears wrote to tell us of the death of Miss Tee Kat (Misty), on November 1st 1976, at the ripe age of 16 years.

Misty was one of our very first TPs. Her dam was called Tiggie. Tiggie had been sired by a fawny-grey coloured cat with mackerel markings, thought to be of Abysinnian type. Mrs Bennett kept Tiggie, having a job to find homes for all the kittens their neighbour's cat sired! In time Tiggie was mated to Chancasta, a SP. In due course, the kittens were born, and in the litter were two tabby point siamese, a male and a female. The female was given to Mr Pears. This kitten they called Misty, and it appeared to be a very good specimen, of this 'new breed'.

Misty when mature was taken along to the Warner's Ch, Spotlight Troubadour. From the first Mr and Mrs Warner were entranced. Phillyda wrote: "She has simply enormous eyes, outlined by dark brown lines which run halfway down each side of her nose — the nose itself was silver, with gold shading near the tip — several dark whisker spots on the white muzzle — and the most exciting curved lines like those of a lynx, along the cheeks, also a beautiful fancy M like tiara on her brow. The background of her mask had an overall silvery look. Pale to dark brown stripes on the legs, and silver tail with black bars and tip. The body shortcoated, sleek, pale, with a suggestion of silver dapples on her flanks".

Misty and Troubadour produced "Praline", who became the founder of the Spotlight strain of TPs,

and dam of the first Ch. in the breed, Ch. Spotlight Pennylynx.

Misty had a good life, and was the founder of many descendants - Let us never forget her, and what she has given us - Our beautiful tabbies.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.

The Fourteenth AGM, was held at the YWCA in Russell St, on 22nd April 1978. To quote our Chairman - this AGM heralded the end of an era - the 'Phil & Perks era'. The Society has so much to thank them for - no words can possibly describe what they have done for us all, and for our breed.

A very unhappy note, was the sad news of John Lyon's death last December, and our Chairman expressed our sentiments admirably - saying that John would be sadly missed by one and all.

A happier item of news was that the licence for our show has been granted. The show is to be run jointly with the Red & Tortie Pt. S.C.C. The show is to be managed by Ann & John Allen, and will take place on 19th May 1979. Members were asked to give the show their fullest support. For more news regarding the Show see the Autumn N/L.

The Hon. Treasurer then presented her report on the Societies A/C's. She stated that the raised subscription rate had helped to make the year quite satisfactory. The Society now has over 200 fully payed up members, and others are joining all the time. It was emphasized that our stalls need to be maintained, and that a new method of organisation would probably be coming into force.

The GCCF Delegate then gave her report, items included were:-

A JUDGES, 'EYE VIEW'
